There she meets Kyle McCarthy, a young man who has befriended her brother. Kyle is kind and attentive. Julianne learns that he's the gardener's son, and training for the Catholic priesthood.

The story told in first person from Julianne's point-of-view, begins in 1961 and told in flashbacks to 1937 when Julianne and Kyle first meet. Any relationship between them is verboten: Kyle is in seminary training for the priesthood; they are from different social classes; Kyle is Catholic in a time when religious denomination mattered.

As I mentioned to one of my friends recently, Iâ€™m not taking chances on new authors too much these days, but Iâ€™m very glad I did with Camille Di Maio and her dÃ©but, *The Memory of Us*. This is such a lovely story. The author writes with real sincerity, and Julianne and Kyle's relationship comes off as emotional and deep. The depiction of life in Britain during the war and the trials and tribulations that the couple goes through because of class distinctions in this era, reads realistically.

The pacing, prose and plot are quality, and certainly higher than expected from a first-time author. My issues with this are all to do with some pivotal decisions Julianne makes (especially at one particular point in the story) that affect not only her life, but Kyle's and others close to her. I understand the traumatic and life-shattering events she went through, and to some degree I understand her decisions. But they seemed to be at odds with her character, and how she was previously portrayed, and I wasn't convinced events would so radically change her personality. Later, she makes another decision and allows years to pass before acting, which I considered far too long, and found frustrating.

This is one of the better World War 2 romance dramas I've read. And with overtones of *The Thorn Birds* this is well worth reading. This is one I encourage my friends to put on their reading list, as I'm pretty sure many of you will love this as much, if not more than I did. I'll definitely read Camille Di Maio's next title. However, Julianne is not like her parents. She has a heart of gold. She is not interested in riches. She is kind and caring. The suitors seem superficial.

While visiting her brother, in secret; she meets a handsome gardener, Kyle McCarthy who has taken notice of her brother and spends time with him. He is an Irish Catholic, an immigrant studying to become a priest, having been accepted into seminary. He is also influenced by his dying mother and father's long time wishes for his vocation. There would be no future for them other than friendship.

Kyle is altruistic, kind, talented (landscape artist), and touches lives of everyone around him. He is caring, hardworking and has a strong love for his father. A million dollar smile--a heart and soul to warm hearts. Their friendship grows, and they become connected in many ways. When they both go away to school, they cannot forget the strong pull to one another--however, neither acts on the growing attraction.

Their paths cross once again months later, when returning home from school for break. A true love and forbidden romance begin. Julianne is not interested in any other guys, and Kyle is being pulled from his devotion to the church. His love continues to grow. They will be together, no matter what.

Her parents will have no part in their daughter dating or thinking of marrying someone beneath her. Their love is stronger and nothing will stand in their way. Their true happiness is tested time and time again.

Then comes war, death, separation from one another. The Hell. Julianne has lost her way. She is now only barely surviving with a loss and burden, so heavy, she can no longer bear.

She had become a different person. A simple person, much different than the girl living in luxury next to Newsham Park. Anonymous. Now, to the point of wanting to end her life. She had nothing left. However, at the moment she is about to end her life, fate steps in.

She is interrupted--a traveling nurse, a midwife, and called to a home to save a dying mother and baby, as she has done many times. A priest, a little rectory split in two, the countryside, and a homely scarred

housekeeper, a safe female attendant for a man living alone.

From symbolism, heart-breaking letters, repentance and joy. From extraordinary courage, faith, and endurance. For fans of Nicholas Sparks' The Notebook.

Throughout the novel, the author explores religious tones and two primary vocations in our faith: priesthood and marriage, and as referenced by DiMaio in an interview, "She considers them to be on equal footing, each modeling a different aspect of the image and likeness of God. We can't have one without the other. Both involve dedication and calling, and each requires taking a lifelong vow."

In the novel, despite, the outside influences; good or bad. Kyle and Julianne are both the subjects of other people making choices for them. (Both families). But, ultimately, they must each discover what it is that they were created for.

Camille Di Maio clearly knows how to tug at heartstrings (mine, officially stretched). An old-fashioned fiercely romantic and touching tale. Another element of surprise--what blew me away, the author is a Texan. You would never know she was not from London; courageous to tackle; well researched WWII, and beautifully written.

The Memory of Us

We first meet Julianne Westcott as a deeply depressed middle-aged woman on the verge of ending her life when she is called to assist with a difficult home birth. When a priest arrives to administer last rites to the mother, Julianne recognizes him as her long-lost first love, Kyle McCarthy. The story then shifts back to 1937, when Julianne is eighteen. While on a secret visit to see her deaf-and-blind twin brother at a home for the feeble-minded, Julianne encounters a handsome seminarian (Kyle) who works there part-time as a groundskeeper. As the two continue to meet under varied circumstances, their mutual attraction becomes difficult to resist. Meanwhile, their country prepares for war.

Di Maio handles certain aspects of the story very well. The romance between Julianne and Kyle was believable and never overdone. Their restraint in honoring Kyle's vocation was commendable. I was interested enough in their relationship to stick with the book until the end. However, small faults all the way through had me on the verge of giving up more than once.

As a historical novel, *The Memory of Us* simply lacks authenticity. All of the characters in the book, regardless of social class, ethnicity, or regional background, sound the same and they all sound more or less American. I didn't notice any glaring errors in the description of major historical events, but when it came to the finer details of life in pre-war England, such as food, money, travel, and social customs, there were a number of incongruities. (I'm about 99% sure, for instance, that no one in England had heard of banana bread in 1937, and only an eccentric would ask for chamomile tea on a train. Also, I highly doubt that (view spoiler)[Julianne would have been allowed to remain in nursing school after she married, and she certainly would not have been allowed to continue working once she became pregnant (hide spoiler)].) These gaffes might be minor, but they occurred frequently enough to distract from the story.

A lot of the story is told through summary and exposition. To a certain extent, this is understandable, as the novel covers a span of almost thirty years, but some interesting parts of the story, such as Julianne's time in nursing school, are largely glossed over. On top of that, the secondary characters are mostly bland and one-dimensional. I was particularly disappointed in the treatment of Julianne's brother, who is barely described, has no personality to speak of, and never develops into anything more than a mute object.

Despite these gripes, I really enjoyed the first 3/4 of this book. In the final chapters, however, Julianne makes some choices that are very difficult to understand and that left me extremely unsympathetic toward her. The sequence of events following her chance reunion with Kyle were, frankly, too far-fetched to be believed, and the resolution of the story was too quick and easy.

Thus, with some regret, I can only give 2 stars.

Narrated in first person tense, the POV belonged to Julianne Westcott; it worked for and against the romance's development. The historical fiction started off with a whisper. It was 1961 and Miss Bailey had been called out to assist with a birth. Before this, she had been contemplating suicide. And then, with little more than a grip to the moment, I was sailing back to 1937. Shifting back and forth between timelines, this pattern threaded all of the encounters together.

For the first third of the story, I zoomed along grasping at what was happening. Julianne met Kyle McCarthy at the Boodle Home, a sanitarium of sorts that hid away and ministered to children of the wealthy. Charles was Julianne's twin and a secret. Her parents never told her about him, she found it out by sheer accident. Kyle was the gardener's son and had developed a special rapport with Charles.
